The Notice of Funding Opportunity, or NOFO, for the federal Continuum of Care (CoC) grant competition—delivered through the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, or HUD—is our largest federal program to provide funding and resources to communities to address homelessness.

“It is supposed to be a foundation for local homelessness response systems. It’s supposed to provide predictability so communities can plan and keep people housed.
